Florida Homestead Starter Checklist

A practical seasonal guide for animals, gardens, water systems, Florida heat, storms, fencing, feed storage and small-acreage planning.

How to use this checklist

Walk the property one season at a time. Mark only the items that apply to your homestead, then add the dates, names and qualified contacts your family would actually use.

SPRING

Recover, repair and prepare for heat

Roughly March through May. Adjust for your part of Florida and the actual forecast.

- ☐ Inspect every livestock shade area at the afternoon sun angle.
- ☐ Test fans, protected cords and backup cooling equipment before dangerous heat.
- ☐ Confirm water flow at every bowl, bottle, trough and automatic valve.
- ☐ Rotate and label stored emergency water; replace damaged containers.
- ☐ Walk fences after winter and repair loose wire, posts, gates and backup latches.
- ☐ Check roofs and feed-storage areas for leaks before rainy season.
- ☐ Watch freeze-damaged bananas and tropical plants for living center growth or new pups.
- ☐ Prune or clean cold damage only when the plant and seasonal timing support it.
- ☐ Review warm-season planting guidance for your county and prepare irrigation first.
- ☐ Clear storm-drainage paths without sending runoff toward animal bedding.

SUMMER

Heat, rain and storm readiness

Roughly June through September. Tropical weather and dangerous heat can overlap.

- ☐ Check animals early, again during peak heat and after hard afternoon storms.
- ☐ Verify shade, airflow and water rather than assuming a full container is working.
- ☐ Rotate frozen rabbit bottles or other species-appropriate cooling supplies.
- ☐ Move strenuous family chores to cooler hours and schedule rest and hydration.
- ☐ Inspect muddy gates, low pens and water areas for unsafe footing and standing water.
- ☐ Keep feed and hay raised, dry, labeled and away from wind-driven rain.
- ☐ Update animal counts, carriers, halters, records and evacuation destinations.
- ☐ Test the backup-water chore route without using the normal well or hose.
- ☐ Secure loose project materials and keep trailer access clear.
- ☐ Use current official storm, flood, drought and county emergency information.

FALL

Reset systems and use the second growing season

Roughly October through November. Florida fall timing varies widely.

- ☐ Use current local planting guidance for cool-season vegetables and herbs.
- ☐ Inspect irrigation after summer use and replace leaking fittings or washers.
- ☐ Thin crowded banana mats only when the plants and weather support the work.
- ☐ Review orchard labels, planting dates, varieties and watering notes.
- ☐ Clean and return tools to their permanent storage locations.
- ☐ Rotate feed and emergency supplies; discard questionable or moisture-damaged material.
- ☐ Repair storm damage before winter fronts arrive.
- ☐ Identify cold-sensitive plants, water lines and animal areas before the first watch.
- ☐ Check frost cloth, clips, safe extension equipment and protected power sources.
- ☐ Review the family's outage, fire and ranch-sitter instructions.

WINTER

Freeze decisions and dry-season observation

Roughly December through February. Central and North Florida cold can arrive suddenly.

- ☐ Follow the current forecast and local official cold-weather guidance.
- ☐ Provide species-appropriate dry shelter while preserving safe ventilation.
- ☐ Protect exposed water lines and confirm that backup containers remain usable.
- ☐ Avoid leaving heaters, lamps or extension cords where animals, bedding or weather create fire risk.
- ☐ Mark dormant or freeze-damaged plant locations so they are not accidentally dug out.
- ☐ Separate dead leaves from the decision to remove an underground banana mat.
- ☐ Observe soil moisture; cool-season plants can still suffer from poor drainage or drought.
- ☐ Use the dry season to inspect fences, gates, roofs and trailer routes.
- ☐ Record what survived, what failed and which microclimates performed differently.
- ☐ Update the spring repair list while the lessons are still visible.
